Law : Human Rights, and Democracy from an Islamic perspective and the practical implementation in Indonesia.</li> <li>6. Islamic Culture: Explanation of Islamic culture and civilization, Islamic values within Indonesian culture, and the reality of cultural, religious, and state negotiations in Indonesia.</li> <li>7. Ethics, morality, and akhlak : Characteristics, distinction, and implementation within society and civic life.</li> <li>8. Worship : Definition, legal basis, obligatory, purpose, significance, application, and its role in individuals, within society and civic life.</li> <li>9.
